At WCC, interns are encouraged to join meetings discussing on various topics, including animation books, video and notebook designs, etc. This exposure provided me with opportunities to explore and develop new skills. I even had the chance to shoot videos and write scripts on harassment issue, a completely new and challenging endeavor for me. I greatly appreciated the trust placed in me, despite being new and still learning.

Interning at WCC became a time for me to explore my capabilities and challenge myself. I am genuinely grateful for all that I have learned, experienced and for the guidance and support I received. I also gained a wide range of valuable skills for my professional future.

My first memorable work was my involvement in the drafting of a Penang state policy paper for civil servants regarding the handling of domestic violence. This assignment enabled me to learn more about the Malaysia and Penang legal framework on women's rights, especially domestic violence.

Another milestone is being part of WCC's organising committee for the Men Against Violence public event which garnered 1,500 participants. I was involved at all levels: from the creative process coming up with fun activities for families, to helping managing a game booth on the day of the event, as well as assisting on the preparation of the materials and general logistics for the event. During the organising of this event, I could really feel that my voice was valued not just as an intern, but as a part of the team. Participating in the organising of this event also allowed me to see the challenges faced by an NGO in the organising of a public event and the subsequent importance of flexibility.

My involvement in the service and outreach sectors was also very precious to me, as I got to witness the direct impact of WCC. Attending counselling sessions for clients and observing court proceedings were opportunities for me to have direct contact with the clients, which showed me just how useful and needed WCC's support work is. WCC indeed provides a safe space for clients to heal and rebuild themselves after a sexual traumatic event, allowing them to gain power back into their lives. I also attended outreach programmes in schools, where I saw how vulnerable children are to sexual abuse. This showed me that preventive work through awareness raising is just as important as service work.

My internship at WCC taught me a lot. As an international relations student coming from France, I am very grateful that I got to understand more about the dynamics surrounding women's issues in Malaysia. I also got to work in a welcoming environment with a diverse team of committed staff and volunteers, and learnt a lot about working in a human rights NGO.
